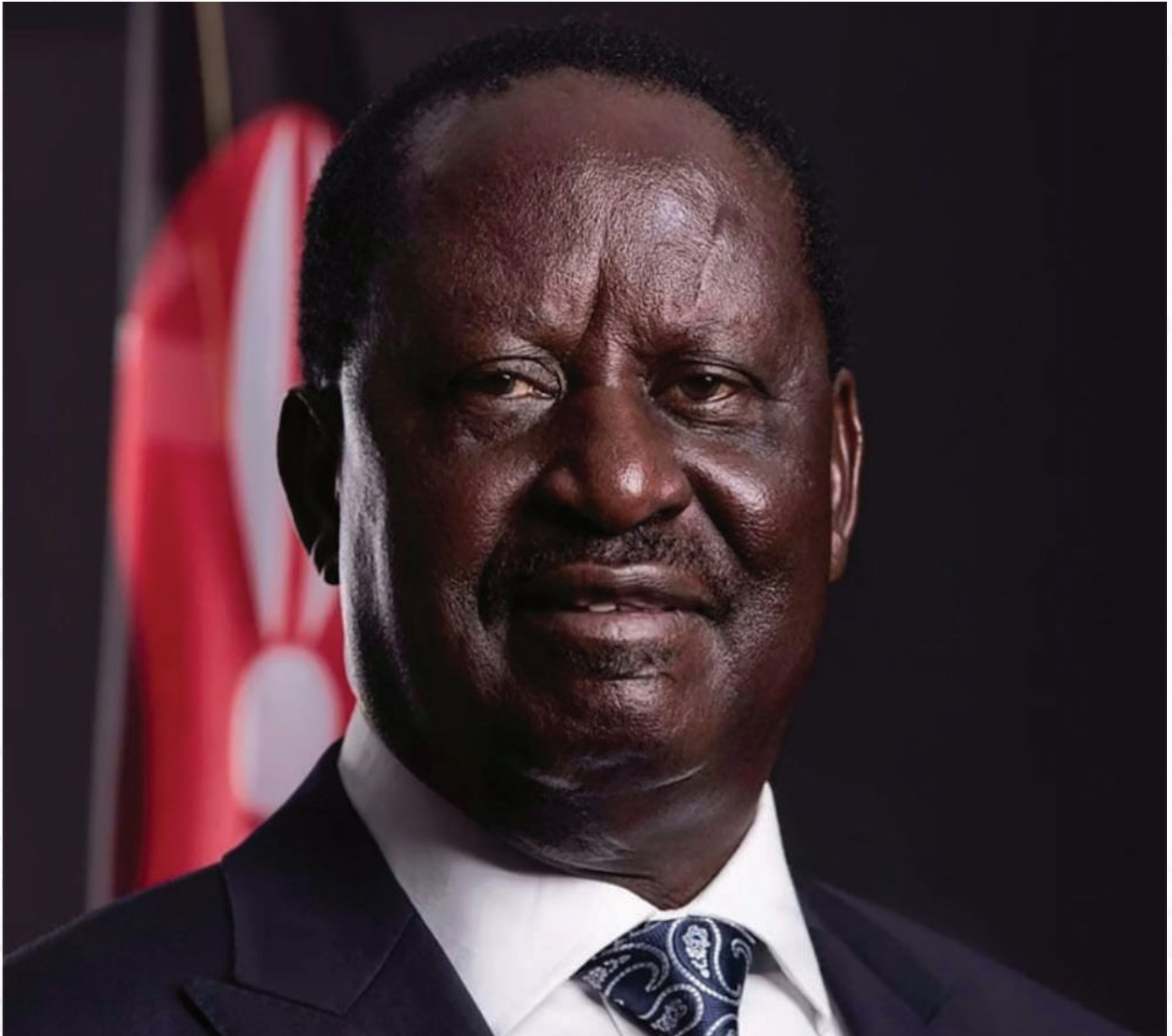

Raila Amolo Odinga is truly a once-in-a-generation leader, a man whose ideals transcended politics and whose legacy will shape Kenya's destiny for generations to come.

President William Ruto announced the demise of the former Premier on 15th October, 2025.

On 15th October, 2025, the mortal journey of the Rt. Hon. Raila Amolo Odinga came to an end, but his spirit is immortalised in the story of a life that began on 7th January, 1945. For eighty years, he embodied resilience, boundless optimism, a will to test limits, ventured into new frontiers and imagined new horizons, all in steadfast love for country. He was a leader who never wavered in his belief in the good of his people.

Raila Odinga lived a life of purpose. He chose to fly high, urged the nation to dare, and challenged Africa to fight for its place in the world and retrace the dreams of the continent's founders.

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Over the past three days, we have witnessed an outpouring of emotions of a nation gripped in grief. Africa has grieved for him. Indeed, the world has grieved for him. A nation and a world struggling with the question, “did we really know him?”, is fighting to find hope in his enduring legacy.

Raila Odinga may not have been there to fight the

country’s war for independence. But he bows out as an undisputed leader of the national rebirth of the Kenyan nation. He easily became the bridge between our generation and that of his father, the late Jaramogi Oginga Odinga, who fought for our country’s independence from colonialism.

He learnt at the feet of Kenya and Africa’s most

revered leaders. He witnessed the liberation ideals and struggles of Pan-African heroes, including his father Jaramogi, Jomo Kenyatta, Julius Nyerere, Kwame Nkrumah, Gamel Abdel Nasser and Kenneth Kaunda, among others. He followed and internalised Nelson Mandela's struggles and agreed with his philosophy that courage was not the absence of fear, but the triumph over it; that the brave man is not he who does not feel afraid, but he who conquers that fear. Raila conquered fear and mastered courage. Possibility of death in pursuit of an ideal was not a reason for Raila to retreat. For he also internalised William Shakespeare's words; that cowards die many times before their deaths; the valiant never taste of death but once.

It is from that perch that Raila began his own long walk for freedom and liberation, applying himself to the cause as a debt owed to past and due to the present generations. Many times he appeared to be on a cause much larger than himself, a mission almost impossible. But that seemed to be the way he loved it, and he gave his life to it.

In emulating the giant footsteps of his father and the spirit of selflessness that run deep in his heritage, Raila Odinga, just as his father once declared that there could be no freedom without the release of their leader Jomo Kenyatta, proclaimed "Kibaki Tosha," a declaration that propelled NARC to bring an end to KANU's forty-year rule.

This defining act was emblematic of the man himself. Raila Odinga was Raila Odinga. He never cared what others thought about him or his actions. He cared



whether people bought into his vision and mission. Once he felt he had the mandate of the people, there would be no turning back.

In the process, he became Kenya's ultimate political prisoner and one of Africa's best known freedom fighters, a dedicated and down to earth servant of the people of Kenya, a headache to the corrupt elite, and a beacon of hope for those struggling for freedom not only in Kenya but across Africa and beyond. Generations to come will honour him and offer gratitude.

Raila Odinga cared deeply about Africa and worried eternally about its decline. For that, he applied himself to peace and reconciliation missions across the continent whenever called upon. During the 1990s, he worked closely with the International Republican Insti-



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tute as a resource person for peace and conflict resolution in the then war-torn countries of Mozambique and Burundi and offered similar support to peaceful electoral processes in Nigeria and Zimbabwe. He mastered Africa's conflicts and the forces and issues behind them.

The highest executive position he ever rose to was that of Prime Minister of the Republic of Kenya, following the signing of a National Accord and Reconciliation Act 2008 which created the office to facilitate power-sharing after the controversial 2007 elections. Earlier, he had served as Member of Parliament for Langata Constituency within the city of Nairobi from 1992.

However, the hallmark of Raila's life and career was not in executive mansions and offices. It was in the struggle for freedom and democracy in Kenya and across Africa, many times telling the continent's dictators to set their people free. It earned him outright enemies, cynical friends and admirers in Africa and beyond.

It is this record that saw him appointed Special Peace Envoy of the African Union in February 2011, following the post-election crisis in Côte d'Ivoire. He juggled politics, entrepreneurship and scholarship with ease.

Besides his career in politics, Mr Odinga is also a successful businessman and entrepreneur, having founded the flagship family business, East Africa Spectre, a manufacturer of gas cylinders for Kenya and the East African region. Subsequently, he founded Spectre International.

Before that, he had taught at the University of Nairobi's Department of Mechanical Engineering between



1970 and 1974 and served at the Kenya Bureau of Standards, which he was instrumental in establishing.

Even as he pursued all these other careers, Raila understood that social, political and economic changes in a country come through politics and that although all politics is local, politics is also substantially international.

So, even as he appeared to be rabble-rousing in the trenches of Kibera and Kondele, he understood that an hour comes when he needed to dust himself off and sit in board rooms or take a plane to global capitols to negotiate politics and policies.

He did that effortlessly, moving from dusty Kamukunji Grounds to a meeting in diplomatic circuits of the country within the hour. It was normal for Raila to be teargassed, water hosed and even shot at only for him to show up at the boardroom for meetings with his tormentors as if torture at the field did not happen. He understood the place of man to man negotiations in the quest to influence policy and power. Raila disagreed fundamentally with many politicians about the state of the Kenyan nation and how to transform it. But those disagreements never stopped him from sitting down with those he disagreed with or sympathizing with the views of fellow politicians.

Raila believed in political parties as vehicles for advancing democracy and good governance. It is upon this belief that he was a founder member of the Forum for the Restoration of Democracy (FORD, later FORD-Kenya) in 1991, the National Democratic Party in 1996, the Liberal Democratic Party in 1997, and in

2005 his present political vehicle, the Orange Democratic Party of Kenya. In 2013, he led his party into a coalition with other parties to form the Coalition for Reforms and Democracy (CORD) on whose ticket he ran for President. He challenged the election results at the Supreme Court, which ruled in favour of his opponents. He accepted the verdict and took up the leadership of the Opposition.

He contested the 2017 presidential election on the ticket of the National Super Alliance (NASA), which election ended up being nullified by the Supreme Court but he stayed out of the subsequent contest.

Mr Odinga was again picked by his coalition, Azimio la Umoja One Kenya Coalition Party, for the presidency in 2022 whose results were confirmed against him by the Supreme Court. He accepted the verdict and has led the Opposition coalition.

Raila's early life prepared him to be a consummate African and citizen of the world, with early education in Kisumu and Siaya before leaving for Germany where he began his high school education at the Herder Institute in Leipzig. He later transitioned to the Otto von Guericke University, Magdeburg, in the then East Germany, where he obtained a Master of Science in Mechanical Engineering, specializing in Production Technology.

In February 2024, Raila visited and extensively toured the two institutions, reliving his days there and recalling that when he arrived in Otto von Guericke, there were not more than five black students in the whole college.

As a leader, Raila believed in and exercised unity,



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selflessness, sacrifice, collective leadership, humility, honesty, discipline and hard work. Other than Kenya, Raila's other greater love was Africa. He celebrated the continent's potential, and mourned its poverty. He mourned the death of leadership on the continent, and felt the pain of its people being left behind by less endowed regions of the world because of failure of leadership.

Indeed, the last major political project Raila quietly embarked on just days before his death was a third biography dedicated purely to pan-Africanism and what needs to be done to take the continent forward.

In October 2018, Raila was appointed as the Africa Union High Representative for Infrastructure Development in Africa. He moved into the position with the swiftness and certainty of fish in water. He named the continental highway networks corridors, railways and airports as if they were here in Kenya. He was at ease with Africa's trade deficit figures in comparison to other parts of the world.

In politics, Raila communicated the importance of reconciliation, forgiveness and putting country over self. He forgave his jailers and worked with them to move the country forward. He emphasised that building a progressive country demanded that leaders rise above anger and the desire for revenge.

He also believed strongly that the preservation of a nation requires the triumph of pragmatism over ideology; that when the nation is under extreme threat, leaders must embrace extreme compromise. He believed power was not an end but a means to an end and it should be used towards the desired end. He believed power should be used to ensure the existence of the nation, not the demise of the nation. He wanted power to be used to ensure progress, prosperity and peace of and among nations and not for any causes that would yield contrary outcomes.

We will cherish Raila's memory in the heart of our nation and, I believe, in the hearts of many African nations.

Fare Thee Well, Our Champion, Our Freedom Fighter, Our Baba. You have fought the long fight, you have finished the arduous race, you have kept the unshakeable faith. Your work here is done. The struggle continues. Rest in Perfect and Eternal Peace.



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PRESIDENTIAL PROCLAMATION

**With respect to the death of
RT. HON. RAILA AMOLO ODINGA, E.G.H.
SOLEMNLY ISSUED AT STATE HOUSE, NAI-
ROBI, on the fifteenth day of October, 2025**

To the People of the Republic of Kenya;

IT IS WITH profound sorrow and the deepest sense of loss that I discharge my solemn duty to notify Kenya, Africa, and the World of the passing of The Right Honourable Raila Amolo Odinga, EGH, the former Prime Minister of the Republic of Kenya.

THE RT. HON. RAILA AMOLO ODINGA passed away this morning in India, where he was receiving medical treatment.

BORN ON 7th January 1945, Raila Odinga dedicated his entire adult life to the service of our nation. The father of our democracy, a tireless champion for social justice, a renowned Pan-Africanist, and a statesman without equal, Hon. Raila Odinga, played a defining role in shaping Kenya's modern political history.

HON. RAILA ODINGA'S name is etched indelibly in the annals of our Republic's journey towards greater freedom, democracy, and prosperity. As we mourn this immeasurable loss, we recall that his was a voice that fearlessly spoke truth to power, championed reform, and summoned us always to the higher ideals of nationhood.



WITH ETERNAL GRATITUDE, the nation remembers Prime Minister Raila Odinga's patriotic journey in the service of our country. This journey made him the most consequential figure in the Second Liberation of our Republic, and the torchbearer in our march toward the Constitution of Kenya, 2010.

AS A UNIVERSITY lecturer, a Member of Parliament on both sides of the aisle of the National Assembly, a Cabinet Minister, the de facto Leader of the Official Opposition, and as the 2nd Prime Minister of the Republic, Hon. Raila Amolo Odinga was the very embodiment of patriotism and selfless servant-leadership. His unwavering belief in Kenya's potential and his lifelong commitment to justice and equity will endure as an inspiration to generations of Kenyans yet unborn.

WE HONOUR AND REMEMBER the values by

which he lived, his dignity, diligence, candour, courage, and profound concern for the well-being of all Kenyans.

IN HIS PASSING, our nation, our continent, and our world have lost a titan of conscience, a visionary of uncommon resolve, and a defender of the defenceless whose legacy will illuminate Kenya's democratic path for all time.

THE FORMER Prime Minister's central role in shepherding Kenya into a new constitutional dispensation is a towering legacy that immortalises him. Kenya is undoubtedly a much better place today because of the struggles, sacrifice, leadership, vision, and courage of a son of the soil, who never tired in the pursuit of a better Kenya.

AS WE MOURN THE PASSING of an icon, we rejoice in the lifelong companionship he enjoyed with his beloved wife, Mama Idah Odinga, and his extended family. Our sincere sympathy to his children – Rosemary Odinga, Raila Odinga Junior, Winnie Odinga and their families, the entire Odinga Odinga family and to all Kenyans. As the former Prime Minister served Kenya, Africa, and the world, he remained a deeply devoted family man, an avid football enthusiast, and an earnest friend to many.

IN HONOUR OF THE LIFE AND TIMES OF THE FORMER PRIME MINISTER RAILA AMOLO ODINGA, and on behalf of a grateful nation, I, WILLIAM SAMOEI RUTO, under the authority vested in me as the President of the Republic of Kenya and the Com-

mander in Chief of the Kenya Defence Forces, do hereby ORDER and DIRECT: –

I. THAT, in testimony of the highest esteem in which all Kenyans hold the person and the memory of Prime Minister Raila Amollo Odinga, the nation will observe a period of national mourning from today until sunset of the day of his interment.

II. THAT Prime Minister Raila Odinga shall be accorded a State Funeral, with military honours and the attendant State protocols being rendered and observed;

III. THAT the flag of the Republic of Kenya shall be flown at half-mast at State House and all Kenyan diplomatic missions, public buildings and public grounds, all military bases, posts, and stations on all naval vessels of the Republic of Kenya, and however elsewhere throughout the entire territory of the Republic of Kenya, from today until sunset on the day of his interment; and

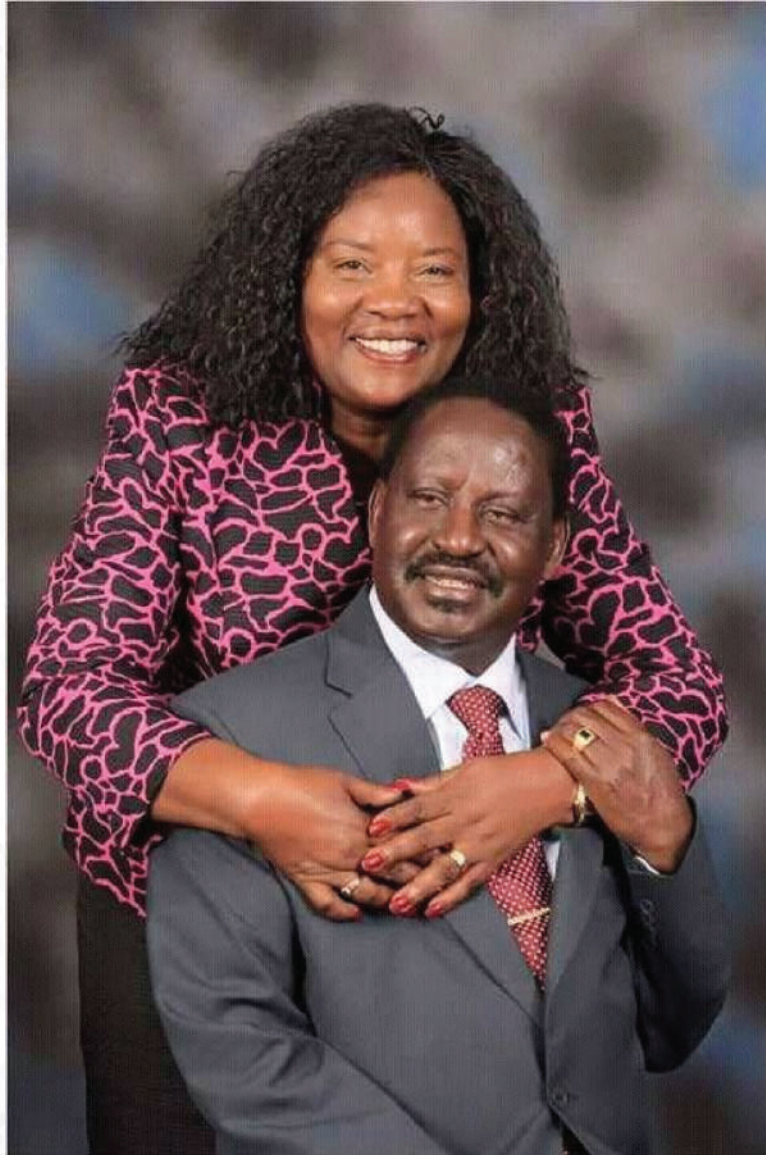
IV. THAT the President, the Deputy-President, the Prime Cabinet Secretary, the Chief Justice, Cabinet Secretaries, the Speaker of the National Assembly, the Speaker of the Senate, Kenya's diplomats abroad, and whomsoever else is so authorised by law, shall not fly the national flag on their official motor vehicles from today until sunset on the day of his interment.

May Prime Minister Raila Odinga's family be comforted; may his memory be honoured; and may his example be emulated."

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Tribute from H.E. Hon. William Ruto, PhD., C.G.H., The President of the Republic of Kenya

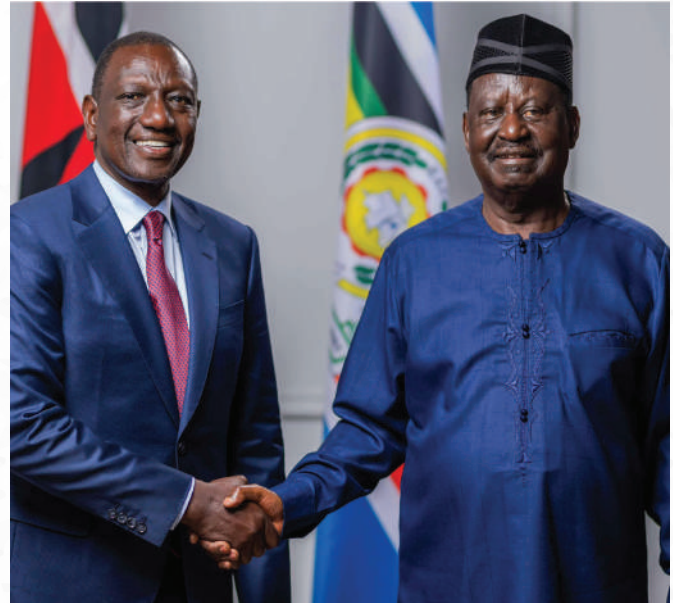


It has been an immense privilege, in the course of my journey in leadership and politics, to work and engage with my dear late brother, the Rt. Honourable Raila Amolo Odinga, in different seasons, while playing diverse roles and under various colours.

In that time, I can say that we came to know each other very well, and forged a relationship that transcended mutual understanding and became a perennial bond, which withstood the furious tempests of our dynamic politics.

As a freshman legislator, I found in the National Assembly a restless and tireless Hon Raila, who had already made an indelible mark as a determined fire-brand who never hesitated when called upon to prove his mettle. In 1996, Hon Raila had done the unthinkable by resigning in his first term as Member of Parliament for Langata due to irreconcilable differences with the leadership of Ford Kenya.

Consequently, he contested the subsequent by-election under the then unknown National Development Party, whose symbol, a tractor, would earn him the nickname Tinga Tinga or Tinga in short. It helped that Tinga happened to rhyme with Odinga, and that is what I, with countless others, called him for a long time.



Hon Raila mobilised non-stop and built the new party from scratch. By 1997, NDP had eclipsed Ford Kenya with 21 members. Following the election, Hon Raila executed a political strategy that confounded friend and foe, which involved finding common ground with KANU and President Daniel Arap Moi, then anathema and implacable foe respectively. In Moi's succession, Hon Raila had spotted a golden political opportunity he could not turn away from and, in NDP and Hon Raila, Moi saw not only safety in parliamentary numbers, but also a chance to build a broad national support base for his succession plan.

It was during this time that I found myself working more closely with Hon Raila as we tightened the nuts and bolts of the KANU-NDP 'cooperation' before transitioning it into the full-blown merger that shook Kenya's political landscape with reverberations that gave rise to NARC and swept KANU out of power to date.

It was immediately clear that, politically speaking, Hon Raila and I had a number of fundamental characteristics in common. Firstly, is his energy and zeal, especially when it came to networking, mobilising and overseeing operations and the implementation of competitive political strategies.

Secondly, his sharp focus, total commitment and unstoppable motivation in the pursuit of what he believed in. Thirdly, his pragmatism and impressive, yet thoroughly principled flexibility when it came to building alliances, negotiation, reviewing and even changing course.

Fourthly, Hon Raila believed in the people as the foremost if not the sole reason for political leadership. Finally, he and I believed in the importance of strong, national parties for strengthening democracy and anchoring good governance. Together with other colleagues, we built a strong party that endures as a powerful institution of our democracy. Afterwards, I have taken part in building equally formidable parties and coalitions from the bottom up.

This similarity had two fundamental implications: When Hon Raila and I were on the same page, we were utterly unstoppable. However, whenever we found ourselves at odds, the going got really tough. It will be an understatement for me to state that, in 2002, things got a little difficult after he left KANU and launched a turbocharged NARC.

Between 2005 and 2010, we were a formidable team. However, between 2010 and 2022, we were once more at loggerheads. I will always be grateful to Hon Raila because, in the last few years, we rediscovered once more the sweet spot and shared a moment of divine grace. I have benefitted immensely from Hon Raila's wisdom and experience as my parliamentary colleague, team leader, Prime Minister, elder Statesman and friend.

For me, working with Hon Raila affirmed certain important truths that, I believe, no leader should ever neglect: Respect for opponents, acknowledging our diversity and different opinions, never underestimating competitors and never losing sight of the humanity of all persons, including our adversaries.

In all the years I knew Hon Raila, I was privileged to witness his devotion to his family, his loyalty to his friends and comrades, his pursuit of the abundant life made up of diverse engagements, all energetically pursued: From sport, business and engineering to innovation, devolution, pan-Africanism and farming;



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from dancing, statecraft and African culture to social democracy.

He impressed me most with the clarity of his conviction that the Kenya we want is within reach if we are committed to do the hard work and make bold decisions; that our democratic experiment must be nurtured vigilantly and matured ambitiously; that leadership always creates space for the youth now, and that Kenya always comes first, and our ambitions are always subordinate to the greater good.

To his last day, Hon Raila was steadfast in the struggle to deliver the Africa Union's Agenda 2063 and the Kenya Vision 2030, beginning at the devolved units. I am a witness of Hon Raila's fiery patriotism, which never dimmed. I know because we had many deep conversations; and we shared the perspective that economic development was the crowning glory of the struggle for freedom, democracy and justice. Hon Raila never lost an opportunity to reiterate the words of the National Anthem, especially the lines: "Justice be our shield and defender" and, "Plenty be found within our borders".

I honour my dear departed brother not only because

he believed in the best of the right things for our country, but also because he never hesitated to stand up for his convictions, and many a time, pay a painful price for them. 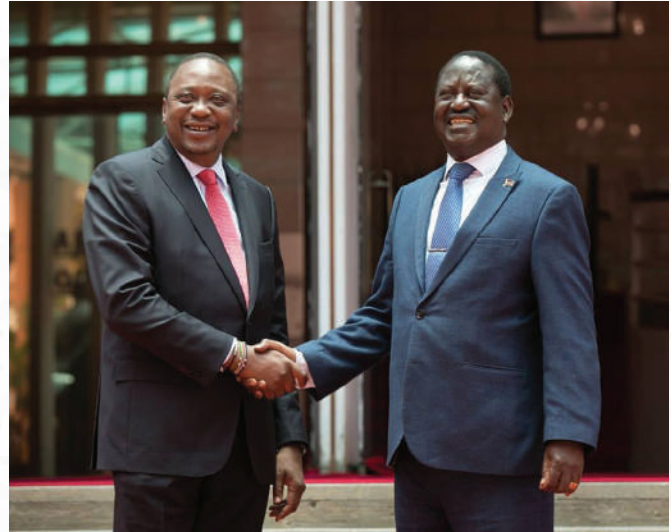

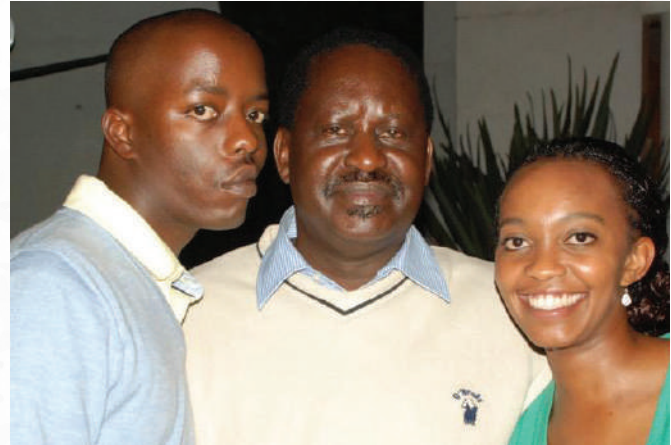
My father was many things to many people, but to my siblings and I, he was simply Dad.

The news of Monsieur being promoted to heavenly realm as was broken to me by my blood sister Dr Ida Odinga hit me like a thunderbolt.

It was like having a nightmare in a broad daylight. If I say I was shocked, it would be an understatement.

I looked up in heaven, where our help comes from and got a revelation that Monsieur was more of a brother to me, rather than a brother-

in-law. A trustworthy brother, a confidant and a counsellor we shared a lot together.

During his wedding with my sister Ida, I had the privilege of being the Best Maid.

Prior to that, I had not even been a Flower Girl let alone a bridesmaid. But at the turn of events the wedding lasted for two days. This was brought about by the wish of none other than Hon Dr Eng Raila Amolo Odinga's father – the Great Jaramogi, who averred that White Wedding Gown had graced his homestead in Bondi; as his first son Dr Oburu wedded in Europe. So the second son Eng. Raila Amolo Odinga had to wed in Kisumu on Saturday and in Bondo the following day (Sunday).

Monsieur Raila was a forceful character with a heart of gold. Never held grudges with anybody, was quick to anger and quick to forgive and reconcile.

When he had classified material or press release to

make, he'd approach me to the editing for him. There's this time he had made up his mind to resign his Langa-ta Parliamentary seat (Ford Kenya) and vie for the same seat on an LDP ticket.

He approached me with a terse sentence:

"Mademoiselle, can you edit this (draft) press release for me to be ready by tomorrow morning? Before I tender my resignation, let this be just between me and you." A phrase I understood very well. At 8.05am the following day, he came and found his document ready.

Monsieur embraced Kenya as his nuclear family; but alas Kenya was not so kind to him. With a number of detentions without trials, came a time when we thought enough was enough. It was, therefore, decided that going out of the country was the best option. He moved into my apartment in Westlands to get some peace and solitude wherein I moved to his

place. This is documented in his autobiography entitled

Even at that early stage, you were an accomplished athlete, excelling in Triple Jump.

Maranda Secondary School at one time cheated in the provincial inter secondary schools athletics competition in Kisumu, by borrowing you, a primary school boy, to represent them in the Triple Jump event. You won the event.

In academics, you were top of your class all the way from year Five to year Eight. Generational peers, who can confirm this fact include Eng. Caleb Olali and Eng. James Jamwa Ogado.

Your leadership credentials were established at the primary school by your appointment as the school captain.

Then you left to study in Germany, returning with a Masters degree in Mechanical Engineering, then teaching at the University of Nairobi before being

appointed as the Deputy Managing Director of the Kenya Bureau of Standards.

Your life was premised on the philosophy that the purpose for living is to create continuous improvement for all people in equity, freedom and fairness.

You always preached the following simple, if somewhat risky, rule: If you believe some act against the people to be wrong and you have a right to correct it, then it is your obligation to try and correct it, regardless of any possible peril to yourself.

This sense of selflessness on behalf of the oppressed often put you into trouble with authorities.

It certainly cost you nine years in political detention.

Those who know you closely can testify that you never regretted that loss of freedom or the possibility that your destiny could have been even worse.

Having learned at your feet, I retain deep pride in the inspiration and encouragement you gave me when I maintained clandestine communication with you throughout your detention years.

Belatedly discovered by the authorities, these so called "seditious" letters were to earn me two separate stints at the Nyayo House torture chambers, and one stint at Kamiti Maximum Security Prison where I lived in Block D with Prof Edward Oyugi, Prof Ngotho Kariuki, Hon Njeru

Kathangu and the late Hon George Anyona. Needless to say, whenever I came out of incarceration, you were always there to reassure me and provide a somewhat caustic encouragement. With your characteristic chuckle followed by a long laugh, you would ask me, "Joe, if I did eight years plus in detention, I know I can trust you to survive about six months here and six months there." Some encouragement, my foot !!!!
But I was strengthened. Thank you for it.
When I come over to join you in heaven, you and I will sing to the angels our favourite duet,
Oyugi Toby's song, which goes:

Chieng' onogo no nyiri gikelo mang'eny matara gana!
Chieng' onogo no sirwari gitweyo matek nya diboro!
Jakinda owad gi Akinyi nitimo kinda gi sirwari.
This song is slightly naughty.

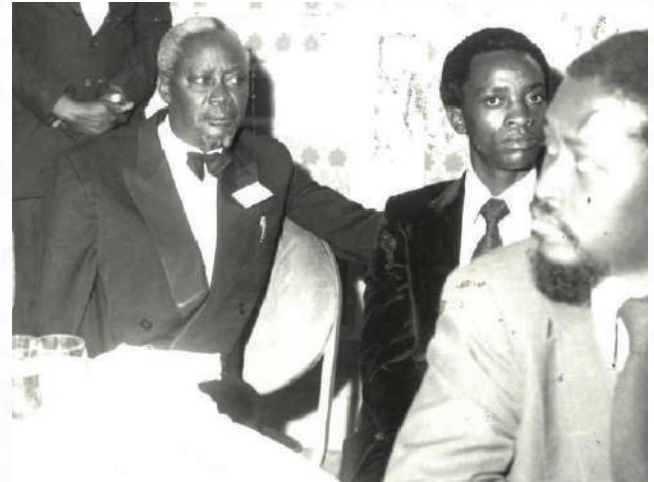

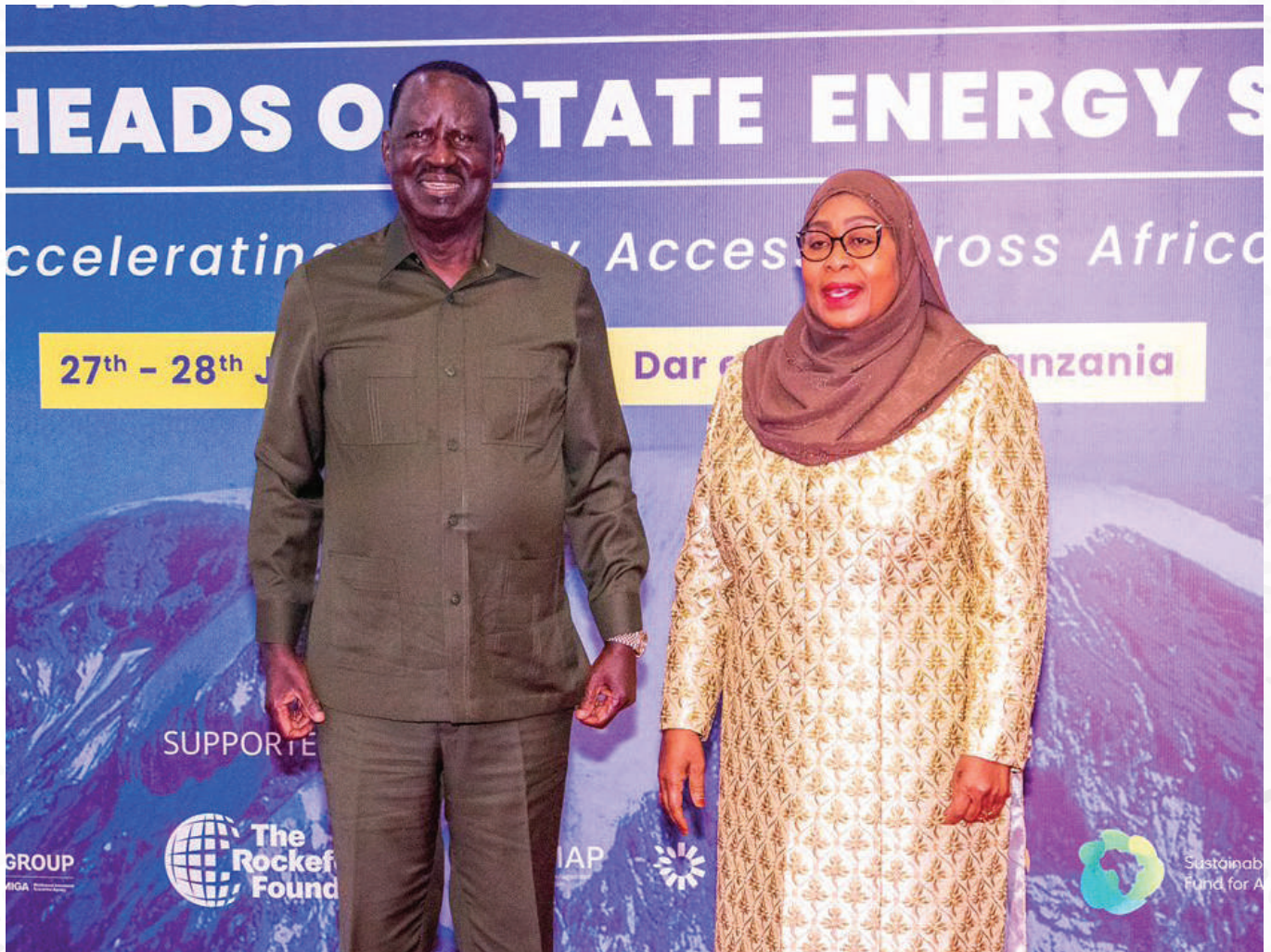
